Leadership Team Overview

Dear parents and carers,

In the junior school, students and teachers have spent the last seven weeks establishing relationships with each other and engaging in meaningful learning experiences across the PYP curriculum. It was wonderful to see how connected our international community was this week when we shared a common lunch and our national dress during the Harmony Day celebrations. Thank you to all who were involved in this wonderful event.

In kindergarten, students have been getting used to a new learning environment with different routines and are now well on their way to understanding what is expected of them. They started the term by inquiring into *Play* and how *it is a way to connect to and learn from others*. This unit of inquiry will continue all year and is rooted in the play-based investigations that take place four times a week. The students are enjoying these authentic learning opportunities and have made connections with each other across the entire kindergarten cohort. They are also just about to begin a new unit of inquiry that will see them investigating how *each of us is an individual with our own identity*.

All students from K-2 have been learning and consolidating their knowledge of 'The Daily 5' during literacy sessions this term. This is a framework that helps students to build stamina and independence in five literacy tasks, so they can fully engage in meaningful reading and writing for extended periods of time. This supports teachers with individual and small group conferencing where reading, writing and spelling goals are set. Students have also been learning how to choose 'Good Fit' books to read at school and home. **If you are interested in learning more about the Daily 5 framework and how you can assist your child with reading 'Good Fit' books at home, we are running a parent reading workshop in the staff room on Wednesday the 27th of March from 10 to 11am.** If you can't make this one there will be a **repeat workshop on Thursday 28th of March in the staffroom from 5:30 to 6:30pm.**

Students in year 1 have also been inquiring into how *communities consist of diverse family structures* and year 2 have been investigating how, *thinking about learning helps us to grow*. Examples of this learning can be seen in the following pages of this newsletter.

Coming up:

On the 29th of March Red Hill will once again be participating in Ride 2 School day. This event normally takes place on the 22nd of March, but we felt that it conflicted with our Harmony Day celebrations so we have moved it. It is also better timing for our year 4 students who have just recently received their 'Box of Bikes' that they will be working with intensely for the rest of the term.

Please keep the new paper recycling area clear of all clothing, lunch boxes, drink bottles and any other miscellaneous items.

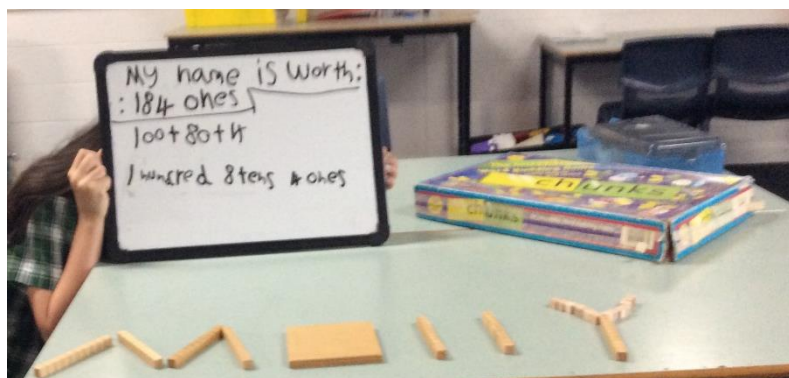
Year 2

Year 2 have had a wonderful start to term 1.

We have been working hard on our 'Who We Are' inquiry, investigating how *Thinking about learning helps us grow*.

Students have discovered their preferred learning styles and have even been inquiring into how our brain learns and changes!

We have discovered how getting enough sleep, water and healthy food can help keep our brains healthy; as well as how our brain creates new neuropathways when we learn a skill!



Our maths investigation has involved understanding how to use directional language and mapping skills to communicate place with others.

We have also been working harder to get smarter at place value by exploring all the ways we can represent numbers and quantities.



We are continuing to build our stamina for independent reading and writing during Daily 5 sessions.

Year 2 have been enjoying responding to quality literature such as Graham Base's *Animalia* by creating our own creative writing pieces, as well as investigating grammar and writing conventions; including factual recounts, letter writing and even comics!

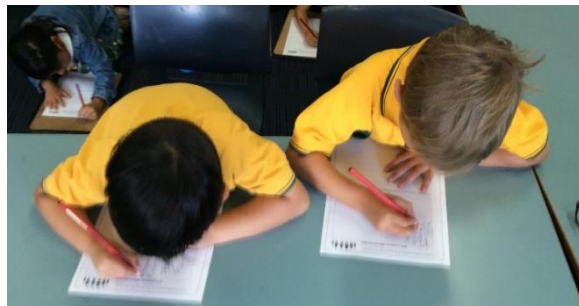


Year 1 Investigations

Who we are

Central idea: Communities consist of diverse family structures

Year 1 have been busy inquiring into families. This includes looking into what a family is, the similarities and differences, and then finally what connects a family. Students have had the opportunity to talk about their own experiences and learn something about the families within their classroom. We are moving towards investigating our connections within the community. Some examples may include school, sports, religion and or interests.



In maths we have been focusing on how time can be measured. This includes discussions about time duration including routines within a day, days of the week, months in the year.

We are also building the understanding that seasons can tell us what time of year it is and linking this to the months of the year.



In literacy we have started to introduce the Daily 5. The Daily 5 promotes independent literacy learners and caters to the individual needs of each child.

Children are given the opportunity to build on and expand their reading and writing abilities throughout the day.

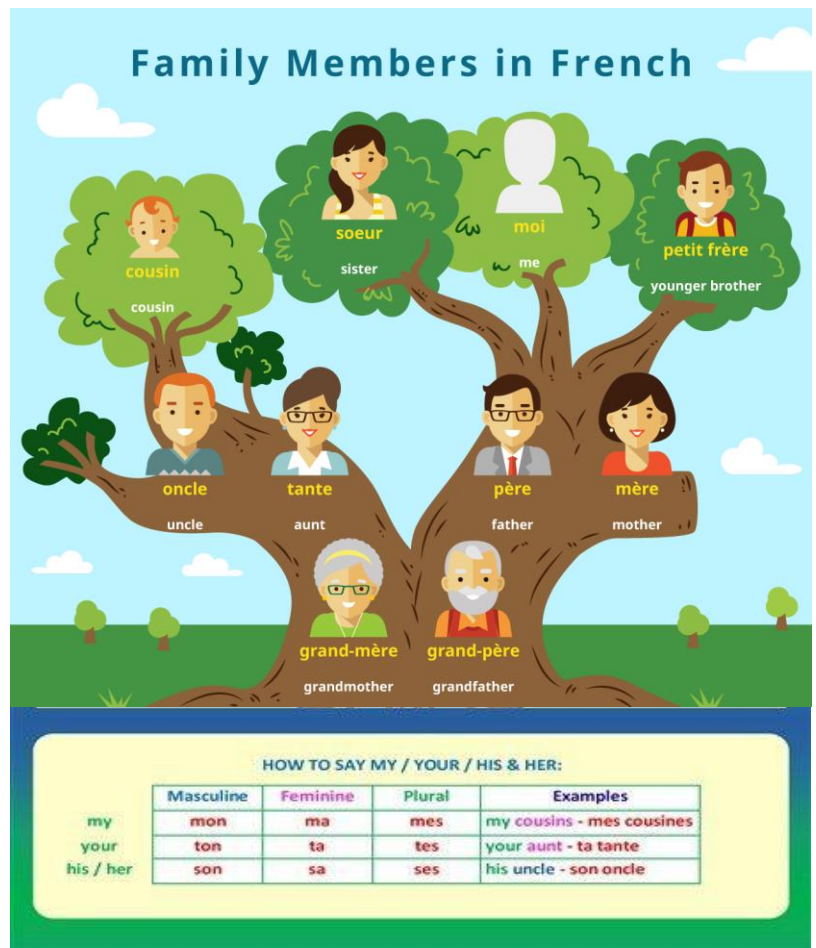

RED HILL PRIMARY SCHOOL P&C LOST PROPERTY POLICY

At Red Hill Primary School, we recognise that items will be misplaced by students and visitors to the school. We therefore endeavour to provide an efficient and effective lost property service for all.

Parents and students seeking lost items should check the lost property.

There is a central collection point (yellow bins) for lost property located in the corridor of the uniform shop. There is also lost property storage located in the morning and after school care hall.

Lost property storage bins are available to be searched throughout the day.

Parents and students are regularly encouraged through school newsletters and handbooks to name and label all personal items including clothing, lunch containers, drink bottles, books and stationery.

Misplaced or lost items are to be brought to lost property as soon as possible. If there is food or liquid in containers, please dispose of the food/liquid before putting in the lost property bin.

Unclaimed but named items will be listed and emailed at the end of week 5 of each term. It is the responsibility of the child or the child's parent/carer/guardian to claim the lost items.

At the end of term all unclaimed named and unnamed uniform items will be placed in the second-hand uniform store for sale or donated to charity.

Other unclaimed items will be donated to charity at the end of each term.
