Leadership Team Overview

Dear Parents and Carers,

I sincerely welcome returning students, staff and families and also those who are new to Red Hill Primary School. We have had many enrolments since the beginning of the year, with a total of 748 students now attending Red Hill School. This time last year we had 694 students!

On the last Friday of term one I was honoured to attend our annual Anzac Assembly, hosted by the year 5 students as the culmination of their most recent unit of inquiry. Many adults commented afterwards that they were impressed by the year 5 hosts and students in general, who, regardless of age, conducted themselves with absolute respect for the occasion and the audience. We were fortunate to have three guest speakers, all Red Hill School parents. Colonel Huxley shared an experience that showed us the connection between World War 1 and family history. Stephen Henderson donated LT Albert Murray to the school as part of the 'Bears to School' initiative. Sharon Bown, from the Australian War Memorial, donated the very special gift of a set of the Australian War Memorial Centenary of Anzac Commemorative Medallions. Each presentation had significance for us.

For those of you who were unable to join us for the Anzac Assembly I would like to share Sharon's final words to the students because they resonated deeply with me.

"On days other than Anzac Day, you may think that as school children, there is not much that you can do to honour the men and women of the Australian Defence Force, past and present. But there are two very important things that I would like to ask each of you to do. Two very important things that I know that you can do:

*I want you to be a **risk-taker**. When you see somebody wearing medals like I am today, I want you to be a risk taker and walk up to them, shake their hand and say "Thank you for your service." This means a great deal to those that have served Australia, and I know that you can do this.*

*I also want you to demonstrate your **principled** behaviour and follow in the footsteps of the Australian children of 100 years ago, children who celebrated the end of the First World War with a national movement for peace. For those of us who have served in war, and those who have lived in countries affected by war, we know that we must do everything that we can to avoid war. Now, you may think that that is a big job for you, but it's actually quite easy. It begins with you, here in your classrooms, in your playground, in your homes and in your community. It begins with each and every one of us being kind to each other, and caring for each other. It seems simple, but if everyone in the world was to do this, we would have peace.*

I know that with your principled behaviour, you will be great leaders for world peace." (Sharon Bown)

STAFFING CHANGES TERM 2

Three of our teachers are each expecting their first child. We have already farewelled Jayne Queripel and we will shortly say "à bientôt" to Tahnee Carters and, a little later in the term, to Tania Brown. Whilst we will dearly miss Jayne, Tahnee and Tania, of course we are also excited for them and wish them the very best as new parents. Sadly, Kadiya Bilston was also transferred unexpectedly to Charles Weston School until the end of the year.

The new staffing arrangements are as follows.

- Claire Kerswell is team teaching with Tahnee this week and will take over 1C from next Monday. Claire comes to us after five years at Mawson Primary.
- Victoria Scarano will be joining us in week three to team teach KB with Tania Brown and then take over the class in week five. Victoria has sixteen years' experience and most recently taught in the UK.

- Tony Cox is teaching 1B on Wednesdays and will also support students in the RTI program on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. Tony has worked at Red Hill School for several years and has many years of experience in education, including leadership.
- Julie Fergusson is teaching 2B on Fridays. Julie is also a highly experienced teacher who most recently taught at Hughes Primary.
- Claire Hansen has taken over Kadiya's role, supporting students for whom English is an additional language or dialect (EAL/D). Claire will also continue her work as a technology coach, supporting teachers and students, and assist the year six team.
- Kylie Birch has joined us to teach the junior students visual art. Kylie has taught as a relief teacher in our school for several years and knows many of the students.

Improving learning and achievement for all students

Reports and three-way interviews

We would like to again thank all the parents, carers and students who attended three-way interviews at the end of last term. These were a powerful opportunity for children to share their work and for parents to get a snap shot before receiving written reports about the progress of their child. They were also an opportunity for teachers, parents and students to have input into the setting of students' learning goals for English, mathematics and other areas. Knowing your child's goals enables parents and carers to support progress at home in a targeted manner, strengthening the relationship between school and home learning. As usual, at the end of this term, you will also receive a written report about the achievements of your child during first semester, along with A-E reports (for students in years one to six). Please contact us soon if you do not wish your child to receive an A-E report or if your family requires two copies.

NAPLAN

Along with all ACT schools, Red Hill Primary is moving to online testing for NAPLAN this year.

NAPLAN testing provides a snapshot of your child's progress at a point in time and is one of many tools that our teachers use to assess student learning and evaluate programs. Testing this year will be conducted between Tuesday

15th May and Friday 25th May. We encourage all parents and carers of students in years three and five to make sure their children attend school during this period and arrive at school on time. We do our best to prepare students for NAPLAN by giving opportunities to practise this style of testing and by reminding them that this is only one form of school assessment that helps teachers to decide what to teach next or teach differently. If your child shows signs of worrying about NAPLAN, please reinforce this same message and remind him/her that doing one's personal best is all that we ask of them. Please let your child's teacher know if you or your child continues to have concerns.

A safe, inclusive and respectful school culture

I would like to give a reminder that teachers are on duty on the asphalt from 8.40am each day. We have noticed several students arriving at school as early as 7.45am. Whilst it is wonderful that these children are excited to be at school, we do worry about them being unsupervised. Teachers are busy preparing lessons and attending meetings at this time, so we plead with you to encourage your children to arrive at school no earlier than 8.40am. We also ask that you remind children that they should not play on the equipment before school and that they should go to the front office, if they need help.

Finally, I would like to thank the families who have already offered to host a Chinese student for three weeks later this term. I am very grateful because this cultural experience will not be a success without family support. I encourage all of you to consider this opportunity. It is incredibly rewarding.

French

Social Etiquette and politeness in France

There are several social etiquettes that one needs to be aware of if you or your family plan to visit France.

Greeting people: Saying hello

No matter who you speak to – in a shop, bar or wherever – it's an unwritten law that you begin with the magic words “*Bonjour Monsieur/Madame*”. If it's evening it is “*Bonsoir*”. When you are introduced to someone, the obligatory *bonjour* is accompanied by a handshake or, when you know them better, a mutual exchange of *la bise* – kissing on alternate cheeks which, depending on the region, is repeated once or twice, sometimes more especially if you visit the south of France.

Addressing others: Vous & Tu

It's best to be guided by the person you're with as to when to switch from *vous* to the familiar *tu*, unless talking to a child or an animal. *Vous*, however, remains 'le must' for addressing anyone you do not know very well or people who offer a service in the community like the police, clerks, post officers, receptionists, retail vendors or anyone dealing with the law services.

Gifts

Without a doubt, it's customary to take a small gift when someone invites you to their home, such as flowers, wine, chocolates, a little tray of small pastries, however, avoid chrysanthemums as they are associated with funerals and are traditionally bought to place on loved ones' graves at the cemetery.

Lateness

It seems that it's an act of courtesy in France to turn up 10 minutes or so after the agreed time if it is a social event, though the same principle cannot be applied to any other sort of appointment when punctuality is essential such as work, interviews or personal appointments, if you don't wish to be seen as rude.

In the cinema

Inconsiderate behaviour like talking, laughing or playing around in a French cinema is never tolerated lightly and people will loudly shush anyone who talks, even in a whisper, once a film has started.

Noise

There are locally imposed time limits for noise throughout France with the annual exception of summer solstice (the shortest night of the year), when *la Fête de la Musique* is celebrated countrywide. One cannot party with loud music until the early hours in the morning.

Neighbours


During the *Fête des Voisins* (neighbours' day) which takes place on the last Friday of May each year, inhabitants of houses and apartment blocks in a street are encouraged to emerge from behind closed doors to socialise and get to know each other in the spirit of the French motto *Liberté, Égalité, Fraternité*. With traffic banned from many streets, folk gather around tables, piled high with food and drink.

Dress code


Dress according to the occasion. French people are most particular about fashion. They economise on certain living expenses but when it comes to fashion, they like to look good. A visit to the *notaire* to sign the final documents for the purchase of a French property is a formal affair, so don't dress casually.

Travel

On public transport around Paris a number of notices, including *les règles du savoir voyager*, inform passengers of the explicit rules of travel, such as: a ticket must be purchased for your dog, unless it's in a basket or a bag, and carrying a package less than 10 kilos is permitted, provided it's on your knees and not a problem for others.

Additionally, for each approved item of oral care waste received by TerraCycle, schools will earn \$0.02 to allocate to themselves or a nominated non-profit organisation.

Safe School Travel in the ACT – Information Sheet 1

General advice to parents

Tips to improve children's safety around your school

If your child walks or cycles to school

- Child pedestrians and cyclists are at greater risk of injury than adults.
- Teach your child the 'STOP! LOOK! LISTEN! THINK!' routine every time you cross the road together:
 - STOP! One step back from the kerb.
 - LOOK! For traffic to your right, left and right again.
 - LISTEN! For the sounds of approaching traffic.
 - THINK! Whether it is safe to cross.
- Always look and listen for traffic as you cross the road.
- After school, meet your child at the school gate. If riding, park your bicycle safely and legally, and walk to the school gate.
- If you are unable to meet your child, arrange for another trusted adult to meet them.
- Until they are at least eight years old, hold your child's hand on the footpath and when crossing the road. Until they are at least ten years old, hold your child's hand when crossing the road.
- Reward your children with lots of attention and praise for good road safety behaviour.

If your child travels to school by bus

Until they are at least ten years old, children have not developed the maturity required to cross the road safely without holding an adult's hand.

- Hold your child's hand and walk together to the bus stop in the morning. If you cannot be with your child, organise for another trusted adult to accompany them.
- If your child comes home on the school bus, meet your child **at** the bus stop, before choosing the safest place to cross.
- Meet your child **at** the bus stop after school. **Never** wait on the opposite side of the road.
- Talk with your child about what they should do if you are delayed and cannot meet them as usual.
- Discuss what they should do if they accidentally get on the wrong bus or miss their regular bus stop.

If you drive your child to school

- Child pedestrians around cars are at greater risk of injury than adults.
- Children aged four years to under seven years must be secured in a forward facing restraint or booster seat.
- Children aged four years to under seven years cannot travel in the front

seat of a vehicle with two or more rows, unless all other back seats are occupied by children younger than seven years in a child restraint or booster seat.

- Children should always get in and out of the car through the rear kerb side or 'safety door'.
- Always drop your children on the school side of the road.
- Meet your children on the school side of the road, preferably at the school gate – particularly in wet weather.
- NEVER call to your children from across the road. Teach them to wait until you come to them. Talk with them about what they should do if you are not there on time.
- Children up to at least eight years old should hold an adult's hand in the car park, on the footpath and when crossing the road. Children between eight and at least ten years old should be closely supervised by an adult in the traffic environment and should hold an adult's hand when crossing the road.
- Always slow to less than 40km/h when travelling in an operating school zone. Children cannot survive collisions with fast moving vehicles. You may not be able to stop in time at speeds above 30 km/h.
- Always obey parking signs as these signs help save children's lives.
- NEVER leave a child of any age in a vehicle without adult supervision. A small child may rapidly suffer dehydration, heat exhaustion and consequent organ failure. Older children could play games that may lead to tragedy.
- Always drop-off and pick-up your children from your school's designated area, following your school's road safety procedures with care and courtesy.
- Some schools in other parts of Australia have adopted a school 'Drop-off and Pick-up' zone – a facility that is convenient for drivers while enhancing the safety of children.
