


Leadership Team Overview

SMART Watches

A number of students are now wearing smart watch devices to school. Whilst these devices can be very useful and allow efficient communication, we have had a growing number of incidents where the devices have become very distracting to both the owner of the device, but also other students near them. We are sure you can

appreciate that when notifications happen during learning time, they can create quite a distraction for those around the device as they enquire about what is happening and who is messaging.

We would appreciate your support in minimizing the impact on teaching and learning by:

- contacting our front office if there are important messages that need to be communicated to a student during the school day,
- helping your child to understand how to adjust device settings so that 'do not disturb' / 'silent settings' are activated during school hours, and
- reminding your child/ren about appropriate times to be accessing and using these devices.

Classes in 2023



Because of the disruption last year due to a pupil free period and many weeks of online learning, we decided to keep most class groups intact for 2022. Some changes were necessary, for example where projected enrolments indicated that we would need a different number of classes in a particular year level. We are currently considering whether we should change all classes for 2023, consulting staff and students. There are both advantages and disadvantages in doing so, which we will weigh carefully before making a final decision. We are interested in hearing parents' and carers' views on this as well. If you would like to provide feedback on your child's experiences with class formation, please complete the survey which will be sent out by email this afternoon.

Where classes must be newly created for next year, we promise that each student will have at least one nominated friend because we recognise the connection between the power of relationships and student learning. However, sometimes a best friend is a good person to play with but not necessarily an appropriate person to learn with in class. Teachers often speak to the students about this, and it is helpful for parents and carers to reinforce the same message.

Given that some year level classes will need to change because of changing enrolments we have asked all students to complete 'sociograms' at school, selecting five peers they believe they would work well with. They will bring these home over the next few days so that parents have the opportunity to talk with their children about their choices. We would appreciate the sociograms being returned by **Friday 11th November**. Please do not sign off on your child's sociogram unless you feel comfortable with his/her choices.

When organising classes, we strive for a balance to ensure that all students have the best opportunity to learn. This is a complex task because we must do our best to balance academic, social and emotional needs, class sizes and other factors. Some student dynamics are also not conducive to optimal learning. Final decisions are made using input from current teachers and executive staff, sociograms and parent requests. If you have any concerns about your child's class placement in 2023, please contact your child's teacher, Nathan James (Student Welfare Deputy) or Louise Owens so we can talk this through before the end of the year. It is essential that, once the classes are formed, we do not make further changes as this can upset the balance of student needs.

It's also important to understand that the choice of teacher cannot generally be used as a basis for forming classes for the following school year and so we ask that parents not request specific teachers for their children. The decision about teacher placements has not been made yet as there are staff appointments still being finalised. Furthermore, teachers occasionally change year levels because they benefit professionally from teaching across all grades and students in turn benefit from teachers' increased capacity to understand where every child is at.

Thank you to the families who have already let us know of changing family circumstances in 2023. **If your child will not be attending Red Hill School in 2023, please let us know as soon as possible**. It is very important that we have accurate enrolment projections so that we can plan staffing and the correct number of classes for next year.

School Travel

Term 4 2022

2023 school travel applications are now open

Applications for student travel in 2023 open from Monday 10 October 2022.

Students who need a School Opal card or travel pass for 2023 can <u>apply</u> now. A new application will need to be submitted if they are applying for the first time, or if they are requesting an additional travel entitlement as a result of a new shared parental responsibility situation (e.g. joint custody).

Students who change address, school, campus location, have repeated a year or received an expiry notification from Transport for NSW for their school travel entitlement should <u>renew or update</u> their details before **the end of term 4**. This will ensure that schools can endorse applications, and entitlements remain valid for the start of the 2023 school year. School Opal card holders will have the changes applied to their existing card.

If a student's distance eligibility has changed based on their grade (i.e. grade two to grade three), the system will automatically update their entitlement if they meet the new criteria. If they do not meet the new <u>eligibility criteria</u>, we will send an expiry notification via email.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition that is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.

Term Bus Pass holders will receive a notification to re-apply.

Students in the Opal network applying for an Opal card (including a Term Bus Pass) for the first time will receive their Student Opal card at their nominated postal address. Cards will be mailed out from January 2023.

Students living in rural and regional (R&R) areas should receive their travel pass at the start of the new school year from their nominated transport operator. It may come via the school or be sent directly to them at home. **Note**: some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

Travel from Term 1 2023

We ask that parents plan ahead and make sure their child knows which service/s to use and has a valid ticket to travel; either a School Opal card or Child/Youth Opal card (within Greater Sydney) or a School Travel Pass (outside Greater Sydney), from the start of the school year.

Applications for 2023 School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) travel open at the start of Term 4 2022, so parents/students can <u>apply</u> or <u>update</u> details early and be ready for the start of the new school year.

Most students using the Opal network will not need a new Opal card and can continue travelling on their existing card each year.

The start of the year is a busy period for local transport operators, and students travelling without a valid ticket make service planning and operations difficult.

School Travel Term 4 2022


We recognise that for some families last minute changes to school enrolments mean they may not have a School Opal card or Travel Pass for the start of term. In the Opal network, we strongly encourage these families to have their children travel with a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their <u>local</u> <u>bus operator</u> to discuss their travel needs.

Bus operators are flexible and understanding, particularly at the start of the school year, and will ensure students can travel safely to and from school. But to best support our operators we encourage all students to have a valid ticket, as early as possible, from the start of the school year.

Students using School Opal cards are also reminded that they must tap on and tap off in line with the <u>Student code of conduct</u> and <u>Opal terms of use</u>.



School Travel



Australian Childhood Anxiety TREATMENT STUDY

Free home-based assessment and treatment for 7 to 12 year old children with fear and anxiety disorders.

Does your child become very afraid of certain situations or objects, worry about a lot of things, get very distressed, or try to avoid things they fear?

About the study

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Our team at Griffith University may be able to assist you. We are conducting a nationwide study that includes the following services at no cost to families:

- A thorough assessment of your child's anxiety with a trained psychologist via the telephone;
- Your child receiving one of two kinds of homebased treatments delivered on a PC, laptop or tablet; and
- Two follow-up telephone assessments with a trained psychologist 6- and 12-months after treatment to track your child's progress.

The study aims to find out if these two treatments are as effective as each other, and which children have the best response to each kind of treatment. This will mean that there are more evidence-based treatments available for helping anxious children.

About the treatments

Each treatment involves your child completing treatment sessions at home on a PC, laptop or tablet.

Each treatment involves your child learning practical strategies to better manage anxiety.

- One treatment helps children learn to control the focus of their attention on helpful things around them.
- The other treatment helps children learn to think differently and approach things they fear.

Each treatment includes information, telephone or email support for parents in assisting their child to better manage anxiety.

Prior studies have shown that children who complete each treatment experience significant reductions in anxiety.
